BE IT RESOLVED that the University Senate expresses grief and regret over the losses resulting from the September 11 attacks;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that at this time of national crisis the University Senate calls on all members of the Columbia community to preserve an environment conducive to the free exchange of ideas and the civil discussion of diverse opinions.

RATIONALE FOR THE REAFFIRMATION OF FREE AND OPEN DEBATE IN THE AFTERMATH OF RECENT TERRORIST ATTACKS

The Student Affairs Committee proposes that the University Senate, in this time of loss, conflict, and change across the nation, reaffirm a principle long-held at Columbia University, that of free and open dissent and debate.

Columbia's student body is now confronted with challenges unlike any previously experienced in American life. Emotions are vehement, and opinions can be fierce. During recent weeks, some student members of the Columbia community have felt pressure to curtail their opinions of the national response to the September 11 attacks.

Yet the continuous practice of free and open discourse produces a cacophonous, vibrant, creative community. This resolution reaffirms open discourse as a prime value in our community and encourages diverse participation in it.
